Keynote Speakers

Ken Mayhew is Professor of Education and Economic Performance and Emeritus Fellow of Pembroke College, Oxford. Professor Mayhew obtained a First in Modern History at Worcester College, Oxford, and took a Masters in Economics at LSE. After graduate school, he joined Her Majesty's Treasury before moving to Oxford. In 1989 and 1990, he was Economic Director at the UK National Economic Development Office, and he has worked as a consultant for a number of private and public sector organisations at home and abroad. In the UK, these include the Department of Education and Skills, the Department of Trade and Industry and the Confederation of British Industry. Abroad they include the EU, the Polish and Belgian Governments, SIK (Sweden) and Group Training Australia. Professor Mayhew was on the Academic Advisory Board of the National Skills Taskforce and Chair of an expert group advising the OECD on the background questionnaire for PIAAC. His major research interests are in labour economics, human resource management and the economics of education and training. He has published widely in these areas. He is an editor of Oxford Economic Papers and of The Oxford Review of Economic Policy, and is on the editorial board of the Oxford Review of Education.

Teodora Boneva is Associate Professor in the Department of Economics at the University of Oxford and Tutorial Fellow at Hertford College. She is also Research Associate at the Institute for Fiscal Studies (IFS), Fellow of the Jacobs Foundation Research Fellowship Program, Research Affiliate of the Institute for the Study of Labor (IZA), and Member of the CESifo Research Network, the Human Capital and Economic Opportunity (HCEO) Global Working Group and the Royan Economic Society. She is a Founding Member & Organizer of the Early-Career Behavioral Economics (ECBE) Conference. Her research fields are Labor Economics and Behavioral Economics. In her current research, she is investigating the role of beliefs in educational investment decisions and the role of educational interventions in fostering skills in childhood.

Dr Kern Alexander is an Excellence Professor in the College of Education at University of Illinois, Urbana-Champaign, where he teaches education finance and law. He is Editor of the Journal of Education Finance, published by the University of Illinois Press and Project MUSE, Johns Hopkins University Press. Prior to coming to the University of Illinois, he served as President of Western Kentucky University, Bowling Green, and of Murray State University, where he retains the title of President Emeritus. Dr Alexander is the author or co-author of thirty books, including *American Public School Law*, 9th Edition, West Academic Publishing, 2019; *The Law of Schools, Students and Teachers*, 6th Edition, West Academic Publishing, 2018; and *Financing Public Schools: Theory, Policy, and Practice*, Routledge, 2015.

Dr David Martin is a former Headmaster of a state school in the United Kingdom. He taught leadership courses at the University of Amsterdam and lectured at Oxford University. Dr Martin has been an International Consultant for Secondary School Modernization in Trinidad and Tobago and in Guyana. He has, also, worked for the Inter-American Development Bank, and has served as Co-Director of Developing Schools and Services for Democracy in Europe and in Oxford. In addition, he has served as a Research Fellow in Comparative Education and Development programmes at the University of Reading.
