F. King Alexander, PhD, is an academic scholar and a national leader in higher education funding and public policy. He has been a frequently invited expert witness in US Senate and US House of Representatives Congressional hearings and has contributed to many mainstream news sources such as *The Financial Times*, *The Economist*, *The Hechinger Report*, *The Washington Post*, *Insider Higher Education*, *The Chronicle of Higher Education*, *Politico*, and *Policy Matters*. He has co-authored numerous books including *Maximizing Revenues in Higher Education* and *Financing Public Schools: Theory*, *Policy and Practice*. He is a member of the Royal Society of Arts and a notable alumnus of St. Peter's College, University of Oxford. He has also served as a public university president and chancellor at four large public universities in four different U.S. states for over two decades.
